WHAT DOES SUCCESS MEAN TO YOU?

Success is a word that means different things to different people. One person may view success as fancy vacations, a huge home, and expensive cars. Another might see success as a happy and healthy family making a positive difference in the world. Still others might simply feel success is financial stability, academic accomplishments, or professional achievements—or a combination of all the above. The bottom line is that there are many versions of success, and likewise, there are even more paths to get there.

This is what The School of Opportunity at Project Patch is all about.

We recently had two different guests share with our teens what success looks like in their individual lives and the paths that led them to that point. One of the biggest

lessons learned during these sessions is that the path to success is rarely smooth, clear, or direct. Ups and downs are normal, detours and u-turns are common, and these obstacles and challenges can actually lead to a more successful future than you had originally been heading for.

Our first School of Opportunity guest this summer was Bill Dolan, president of Spirit Media, and an Emmy-nominated creative director with over 30 years of experience. In 1999 Bill experienced one of these obstacles. As he puts it, "On January 28th, 1999, while on a flight to Nashville, I died... and it may have been the greatest thing that ever happened to me." That fateful day on Bill's path changed everything, "challenged his world view and approach to communication and marketing," and as a result, his book, *The 7 Disciplines of Relationship Marketing*, was born.

Our next School of Opportunity guest was Terry Wilt, COO and co-founder of TAG Manufacturing (cofounded with his older brother Gary – thus where TAG comes from), a leading designer and manufacturer in the construction equipment industry. Terry struggled in school with dyslexia. Many didn't predict he would be successful because he didn't go to college and wasn't comfortable speaking in front of groups. Yet Terry knew how to work hard. He started a business and learned how to get large tasks done. He learned to assemble teams and, most importantly, care for his customers. Terry showed our teens that you can be successful even if you don't excel during your school years.

Both of these stories were inspiring to our teens. They demonstrated that success for Bill looks very different than success for Terry. While their paths had ups and downs and different challenges, they ultimately led to successful lives. Now, the question is, what does success mean to you, and are you willing to take the steps to get there?

MARANATHA - BUILDING PEOPLE

The mission of Maranatha Volunteers International is to "spread the gospel throughout the world as it builds people through the construction of urgently needed buildings."

The organization is well known for building over 14,700 structures in 88 countries, including 25 trips to the Project Patch campus. Over the years, this amazing organization has contributed to the construction and renovation of nearly every building on our campus. In the past four years, they've been on our campus for five projects and have been instrumental in repairing, beautifying, and improving our buildings. However, Maranatha Volunteers aims to do more than construction; they want to impact lives with the Good News of Jesus.

This spring, 25 volunteers spent 17 days transforming our girls' dorm with new flooring, painting buildings to match others on campus, and making repairs to staff housing. Yet, the most significant transformations took place in the hearts of the teens, staff, and volunteers.



When different generations such as these come together, there's a unique bond that forms. The shared meals, especially the desserts, are always a hit with our teens when Maranatha is on campus. But it's the conversations during these meals that our teens and volunteers cherish the most. They can be overheard talking about their lives, families, hobbies, and work. Many of our teens even come to consider the volunteers pseudo-grandparents and invite them to their graduations. This sense of community and connection is what makes these experiences truly special.



The teens discovered that the volunteers had a lot to teach them. They enjoyed learning to cook from Miss Carol and other kitchen volunteers, and playing catch with Terry. They also learned about perseverance and work ethic as they watched volunteers get up from the table day after day, stretch sore muscles, and return to work.

By far though, the most common observation shared by teens and staff was the kindness, compassion, and acceptance of the volunteers. One teen expressed it this way: "They are very kind and sweet and they don't judge you. They accept you for who you are."

Teens (and floors) weren't the only transformations during the project. Volunteers were encouraged as they witnessed God at work in the lives of His children. They recognized the impact made over time, on both teens and buildings, when volunteers share their time, skills, and resources.

As the volunteers prepared to leave campus, several things were evident—the appreciation of our teens and staff for the hard work and new floors, the volunteers' love-filled exhaustion, and most importantly the beautiful friendships that had been made between them all.

"[Maranatha] doesn't just improve our buildings and the looks of our campus," shared one staff member. "They bring joy and encouragement to our lives too."

Maranatha spread grace across campus as they worked on urgently needed projects. Mission accomplished!

Tom felt called to help kids but was reluctant to leave the predictable life he'd lived as a successful pastor and step into the unknown and often messy life of helping struggling teens. Bonnie, his wife, reminded him that neither God - nor she - would let him rest until he followed the call to help teens.

In 2009, reflecting on our 25th anniversary, Tom shared, "I would never have dreamed that we would have impacted

so many lives." As we reflect on 40 years of ministry, we don't celebrate the years; we celebrate the changed lives of the kids we serve and those of us who participate in the miracle.

This year feels like driving a car with a manual transmission. There is a moment of pause as you push in the clutch, shift to the new gear, and re-engage the transmission.
